RE-CYCLE INK CARTRIDGES



The Stewardship Committee, in the interest of going Green, asks that you bring your used Printer Ink Cartridges to church to be recycled. Any brand; color or black

cartridges can be donated. There will be a special box in the foyer to place them in. We will reduce the waste entering landfills by taking the cartridges to a collection drop where they can be recycled properly. Even better, you'll help our church receive up to \$30 a month on our Staples Reward program account for the cartridges collected to help defray the cost of our church's office supplies.

FYI: Staples stores collect used e-waste; computers, monitors, laptops etc. A maximum of \$10 for large items is all it will cost you to dispose of old unwanted items. Small items such as keyboards, mice, speakers and toner cartridges are accepted at no charge. The stores also collect cell phones, PDAs, pagers, digital cameras and rechargeable batteries. They use a data destruction first, then send them to be refurbished, if possible, or taken apart and the parts recycled separately. 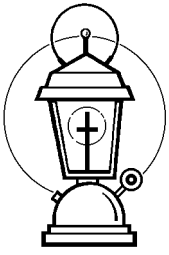
Week of June 21st

Sweet change

Congregation grows by drawing Sunday evening toe-tappers

More than a year ago, an idea surfaced that would result in dramatic change for Living God Lutheran Church, Honey Brook, Pa. Those resisting change left, but most stayed. And in the end, the church found harmony through a toe-tapping, hand-clapping Sunday evening worship of bluegrass gospel called Sweet Water Sabbath.

Richard L. Moore, pastor, wanted not only growth for the 15-year-old mission congregation but also to ensure community outreach.

"We take a usual contemporary service and retrofit it to bluegrass," he said. "We probably have the only Sunday evening bluegrass service east of the Mississippi."

Howard Moore (no relation) and Ramona Wilt of Sweet Water Bluegrass provide the music. They first played for an evening service during Holy Week. Then they helped out when the church was short a musician for the regular worship service. The positive congregational response resulted in evening services on a trial basis. "They packed the church," Richard Moore said.

Bluegrass lyrics, with its roots in African-American gospel music and blues, speak about day-to-day life experiences. Sweet Water's songs enable listeners to connect biblical stories to their life stories. "All we care about is giving people an uplifting experience — bringing them out of their rut for a short while," Howard Moore said.

After the trial period, the congregation wanted even more. But that meant paying previously unpaid musicians — a big step.

Member Steve Schmidt (recently deceased) donated \$9,000 to cover a half-year's expenses. Schmidt and the pastor had the vision that this worship style would reach a demographic uninterested in traditional worship.

The two were right. One-third of the 30 new members joined because of the bluegrass service, Richard Moore said. Regular attendance increased from 160 to 215, and giving increased as well — approximately \$11,000 over the expenses for the music program.

What started out with bluegrass outreach even resulted in several adult baptisms — and other adults finding their way back to church.

Carole Turner, who hadn't been to church in 35 years, was dragged to Sunday night worship by her brother and his wife. She's been coming ever since. "I like the pastor, I like the service ... and I just told the pastor tonight that I am joining the new-member classes," she said.

Ramona Wilt, acoustic guitar player, and her husband, Howard Moore, mandolin, sometimes bring her daughters Helene and Sarah Wilt to sing. "Pastor Moore's down-to-earth style correlates to bluegrass music and how it spreads the message," Wilt said. "This is nontraditional Lutheran music — more of an outreach. People come to the service because they like the music, but if they stay, it's because they like what God is doing here."

And God is doing more than causing worshipers to tap their toes — partly due to the inspiration of a member who attends the bluegrass worship. Pam Latham's husband, Link, was baptized after attending the service with her. She wanted to do community outreach. Her idea was to offer a free meal once a week to anyone who needs one. The result is Aid for Friends, a nonprofit mission in the five-county Philadelphia area that connects churches with older adults, enabling them to remain at home.

"Congregants make one extra plate when making dinner," Richard Moore said. "We freeze them at church then deliver them to the families. Others visit to build relationships."

Those who launched Aid for Friends knew the ministry needed the entire congregation. "It couldn't just remain an isolated program for the evening worshipers," Howard Moore said. "So this program is just one example of how the addition of this worship service became a positive influence for the whole congregation. ... The bluegrass members are serving the whole church, not just creating a separate club."
